There have been concerns raised about the safety of children when crossing Raglan Rd to get to or from school. We have been in contact with transport officials from the council and have had one monitoring visit from an officer with more expected. Most of the traffic at the start and end of the day is school related so please be aware of your driving habits in this high risk area. Many parents are also in the habit of using the zigzag lines as a handy dropping off point.

Please do not do this. The lines are only there as a safety measure for our children.

We don't want anybody's child to be the one who is hurt by careless driving.

Headlice

For years headlice have been an ongoing problem in every primary school in the country, and indeed around the world. The days of the 'Nit Nurse' are far behind us but we know that a child, or a member of staff, coming home with a new infestation is a cause of great stress to families. We want to reduce the possibility of that stress as much as possible, but it is a problem that will never go away completely. We have searched the globe for advice being given to parents to help manage the problem. One of the better sources was in New South Wales in Australia. Their advice is

- Regularly check your children's hair
- Tie back and braid long hair
- Keep a fine tooth head lice comb in the bathroom and encourage all family members to use it when they wash their hair.

However they too state, 'There is no single solution to eradication, only persistence.'

Tying back of long hair is the only one of these we can monitor in school and we encourage parents of children with long hair to have it tied up as much as possible. We would like parents to inform us if they have noticed eggs or live creatures when carrying out their checks so that we can warn other parents in the class to be extra vigilant in their checking and cleansing routines. I am not endorsing any products, and it may have been a coincidence, but personally I found the frequency of infestations in my family dropped when we began using cheap 'tea tree oil' based conditioner.

There has been a recent infestation in one class in the school which has proved difficult to manage. This has caused great frustration on the part of some parents who have taken to social media to express their frustration. Some of these messages have been very negative about other families supposing them to be the cause of the problem. Inconsiderate posts, based on supposition, are very hurtful and reflect badly on the community of St Joseph's as a whole. Posts of that kind are the very type that we are attempting to educate the children not to use when they are online. Please bear in mind the impact making derogatory comments can have, not just on the recipients but also on any children involved, before pressing the final 'post' button.
