
counted as absences in the calculations we make in this situation. In the last week we will have our 99 Club where all children with 99% or better attendance will get a 99 ice cream treat.

### Covid Changes






we will be asked to maintain our bubbles in that last week and that staff will still be asked to wear masks in communal areas of the school. Staggered start and end of the day will also remain.

The fine for parking on double yellow lines is usually £70, but it can vary depending on where you are in the country. 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Is It Coming Home? Whatever the result of the match on Sunday it will go down as an historic occasion. Football has been in the news for other reasons this

season and Marcus Rashford and Raheem Sterling have been at the forefront of campaigns against racism in society, and football in particular. Sadly this is not a new problem. Seventeen years ago St Joseph's children featured in the Evening Herald for taking a stance against racism after black English players suffered abuse in a game that took place in Spain. One of their posters read, "If the colour of the football doesn't matter why should the colour of the player matter. Stop Racism!"



It is a shame that seventeen years later the beautiful game is still spoilt by the actions of a small minority. I did hear this week that one little girl who was in the school at the time is starting work in the Home Office next week so I am sure she will be a force for good in that institution.

Hopefully football will be the winner on Sunday evening. I would like to take this opportunity to reinforce the message that St Joseph's children gave seventeen years ago to kick racism out' by letting today's children have a non-uniform day like the children did in 2004. I am sorry for the short notice but I would like the school to be full of a mixture of all colours on Monday. Rather than wearing school uniform I would like children to wear a top of their own choosing. Red and white

for England may be very popular. Football shirts of any colour will be welcome. I wonder if there are any Argyle shirts out there. If you do not have a football shirt it doesn't matter just wear a colourful top. Hopefully then every time England get to a final in the future our children will associate that with the anti-racism stance we are taking.
