Worship and Liturgy - 3rd Sunday of Advent



In this Sunday's Gospel we are again told about John the Baptist, 'preparing the way' for his cousin Jesus. He was asked lots of questions. The children were asked today to reflect on what questions

they would ask John the Baptist.

Covid Update

For the Christmas break the government have issued guidance on the situation if there is a positive test, for pupils or staff members, following symptoms developed within 48 hours of attending school.

"For the first 6 days after teaching ends, if a pupil or staff member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms within 48 hours of being in school, (ie before 3.30pm on Sunday 20th) contact the school either on the school mobile number 07422938855 or email to

<u>giilbest-josephs.plymouth.sch.uk</u>. The school will need to assist in identifying close contacts and advising self-isolation, as the individual may have been infectious whilst in school."

"Where a pupil or staff member tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19), having developed symptoms more than 48 hours since being in school, (later than 3.30pm on Sunday) the school should not be contacted. Parents and carers should follow contact tracing instructions provided by NHS Test and Trace."

Please be especially vigilant over Covid safety measures during this next week. One person's infection could ruin Christmas for a whole class who could be asked to self-isolate. If you do need to inform me of a positive case please entitle the email Positive Covid Case and it will get my attention as I won't be opening all of the multitudes of other emails I am likely to get during the Christmas holidays. The government has offered schools the opportunity to close a day early this term so that staff would not be required to monitor emails and texts and deal with Test and Trace on Christmas Eve. We have decided that the disruption that an early closure would cause to parents would be greater than the potential risk of dealing with a positive case on Christmas Eve so we will be open on Friday 18th December. The first day back in the new year is Monday 4th January.

Agents for Change – Road Safety



Key stage 2 children got a real feel for being campaigners on Thursday.
Class 3 were film makers teaching children how to cross the road safely.

Their message was about speed so close to a school and the poor signage letting drivers know that a school is nearby. Local Trips

As part of our Agents for Change Day some of the classes walked out into the local area as part of their learning. In the past we used to ask parents for their consent for any local trip. This consent lasted for all the time their child



was at St. Joseph's. The latest advice from our Outdoor Education advisers is "Schools are not required to obtain consent from parents for pupils to participate in off-site activities that take place during school hours and which are a normal part of a child's education, such as local studies and visits to a library or museum etc.... While parents do not have the right to withdraw their child from the school curriculum, it remains good practice to inform parents that a trip or activity is to take place. "We will no longer ask for consent for local trips but will inform parents that a trip is going to take place. If any trip involves greater risk of any kind, or is for a residential trip, parents will be given more information and asked to give informed consent for that one off trip.

Welcome

A new member of staff joined us this week. Miss Woffenden will be a teaching assistant in Class 2. She will be working mornings until the end of term and then full days for the rest of the academic year. The children have already made her feel welcome.
